Orveaux

The name of Orveaux is not  
bizarre, but it is, to be sure, a mere  
derivation of the bizarre name  
Orveaux, which is given to this  
village by the Bretons. In fact,  
Orveaux is a compound of orve  
"juniper", and aux, the usual  
Breton term for indicating absence  
of anything. For instance: Arigorveaux  
(arri=stone; gorri=red-), with the  
Breton term aux, means "place  
abounding with red stones." In the  
same manner: orve=juniper, with  
aux, indicates "place abounding  
with juniper". Now Orveaux,  
in all senses, is nothing else but "Valley of Brier  
(or Bramble)". Juniper leaves have  
sharp points, and the analogy  
between Orveaux and Orveaux  
is evident.

P. S. The word Orve very rarely  
orve is ~~used~~ used  
in this sense directly only: generally  
south high-lands. It is not known in  
east low-lands. The other form: Orve, Orve, Orve,
